Homework

We encourage all children to read regularly for 20 minutes at a time at least 4 times per week (7 days). As older readers, many Year 6 children are now free readers and do not need to be listened to aloud by an adult, but to establish good understanding, it is always good to talk with your child about they have been reading. Remember also to record in their reading records the amount of time your child has read with the date and any relevant comments, as well as a signature, please. Reading Records will be checked on Fridays to see that children have read for a minimum of 80 minutes each week. The children are asked to read different types of texts, as well as develop their own tastes across a variety of genres and authors. With this in mind, we would like to remind you that children should read a combination of fiction, non-fiction, media and poetry and record this in the tally chart in their reading records please.

Children will be given spellings, literacy and maths homework on a Friday which should be returned the following Friday. Please practise spellings daily if possible—little and often is the best way to learn them. Spellings will be tested on Friday morning.

Times Tables

Please help your child to learn any unknown times tables facts regularly with games, quizzes and tests: it really is essential that they have quick recall of these facts without having to count up multiples on their fingers. It aids efficiency in arithmetic and will really speed up their calculations.

Expectations in Year 6

Children throughout the school are encouraged at all times to be polite, diligent and hard working., but it is even more important that Year 6 pupils are seen to be setting an excellent example to the younger children of the school community, as prefects and role models. We want the children to do the best they can and feel a sense of pride and achievement in everything they do. We put emphasis on the presentation of the children's work and we encourage and teach independence and organisational skills.

Class rewards

House points are given to individuals as reward for excellent behaviour, attitudes and work. Each week star awards are given and announced in assembly, but green cards will also be given for outstanding efforts and exemplary behaviour.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back Year 6! I hope you all had a safe and happy summer. This leaflet will keep you up to date with your child's learning during the first half of the Autumn Term. Our topic this term is 'What did the Victorians do for us?'

<u>Literacy</u>

During this term's literacy, we will look at a variety of forms of writing including setting descriptions and how to create atmosphere and evoke emotion, creating characterisation and how to convey personality, mood and dialect, as well as reading and writing historical texts, inspired by Victorian author Charles Dickens and our class book 'Street Child', set in Victorian London, which will be the basis of much of our Literacy tasks and links well to our History learning.

On a weekly basis we will also be covering the following:-

- * Whole class reading
- Individual reading either independently or to an adult.
- * SPaG (Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar) lessons.
- Weekly spellings are sent home to reinforce what is being taught in school.

Maths

In maths we will continue to build on your child's knowledge of number in the first half term, beginning with Place value and the number system, including negative numbers. We will then learn the formal written methods for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, using these to solve problems through various contexts. I cannot emphasise enough how important it is to know times tables and ask that these are regularly practised so that your child can recall these facts quickly and randomly.

Computing

This term we will continue to build our knowledge of how to stay safe online. We will consolidate how to keep information online secure, how to know how to trust online sources of information and how online content targets users to gain money or information. We will also learn about how the use of devices and excessive online activity can be harmful to our health and wellbeing.

<u>Art</u>

Children will learn about the proportions of a face and learn the differences between realism and abstract styles by creating different portraits. They will also make clay gargoyles using various modelling techniques.

Science

This half term our science topic is 'Light'. After reviewing how shadows form and investigating what affects shadow length in a number of fair tests, we will learn about how the eye works, how light travels, about reflective surfaces and investigate angles of incidence and reflection.

RE

In RE we will be learning about what it is like to live as a Muslim in Britain today. We will use the 5 pillars of Islam as our starting point and consider the lives of British Muslims.

<u>History</u>

Our work in this subject aims to answer the question: 'What did the Victorians do for us?' We will find out who the Victorians were, when they lived and learn about key inventions and events, including the industrial revolution and introduction of the railways. Our School Trip will be to the Bodmin and Wenford Steam railway and to Wadebridge Museum and the Camel Trail to learn about the impact of the railway to Cornwall. We will also learn about school and working life for Victorian children as well as Queen Victoria herself.

PSHE (Personal Social and Health Education)

Each week the children will have PSHE lessons based on the Jigsaw Framework. During this half term, we will learn about 'Being me in my world'. This unit focuses on the year ahead, being a global citizen and creating a class charter of what our expectations of ourselves and one another are.

<u>Music</u>

In music this term we will be covering the Charanga unit of 'Happy' using the pop song of this title by Pharrell Williams as our focal point.

<u>PE</u>

This term the children will continue to have PE on a Monday afternoon with Mr Baines and a Tuesday afternoon with Mr Rickard. In PE this half term we will be athletics and football.

<u>French</u>

The topic for this half term's French covers the themes of seasons and weather. Pupils will learn the French words for the compass points, how to describe the climate and geographical features of different places and which countries border France. Children will also learn and perform a French Poem about Autumn.
